

REMEMBERING DICK WILLIAMS



Dick Williams 1943 - 2022

When you ask Belted Galloway Society members about Dick Williams of Marietta, SC, you hear about his kindness, humor, wisdom, integrity, and his knowledge of cattle.

Dick was a true southern gentleman that was always ready to shake hands, listen to people and support those around him.

Dubbed "The Governor" by Mike Crittenden of UT back in the early 2000's, Dick's regal appearance and impeccable manners made him someone you would never forget.

Dick served on many committees over the years and more recently was an elected member of the Belted Galloway Society Council. He was someone who you would find at events, sharing his knowledge of cattle and the breed with new breeders as well as asking questions and sharing stories with established breeders. He was always interested in your cattle and willing to discuss pedigrees or family when he would stop to talk. He would be the first person to congratulate you on your successes or \ encourage you to work through the difficult moments.

Dick made extensive use of embryo collection, Artificial Insemination, and IVF within his herd. One breeder spoke of how being able to work his cattle and see his flush groups, allowed them to observe phenotype and temperament of multiple sires and dams popular at the time. Doing so helped direct them to what genetics they liked and wanted to reproduce and those they felt did not work for them.

The impact of Dick's breeding program range far and wide and you will find Stonesthrow cattle in pedigrees around the country. Many national Champions trace back to cattle he bought, bred and/or sold throughout the years. He was selective in what he bred and did not perpetuate or pass on to other breeders those matings that produced undesirable offspring. He was the height of class and integrity in how he managed his breeding program.

Dick partnered with many breeders over the years. Partnering with them on cattle that they flushed and then splitting up the resulting offspring or staying partners throughout the animal's lifespan. If you had the chance to partner with Dick, you knew he would communicate with you and follow through with any agreements. More importantly, these partnerships often lead to life-long close friendships.

If you were lucky enough to have visited with Dick and his wife, Lisa, you would have had the pleasure of seeing good cattle and enjoying wonderful hospitality. There was nothing more majestic than sitting on the front porch and viewing the mountains of western South Carolina. May there be good cattle and a porch for him in eternity.

- 1. Be a member of the Belted Galloway Junior Association, the Belted Galloway Society Inc., or be a child or grandchild of a BGS member;
- 2. Be either a graduating high school senior or a college student, or be enrolled in an advanced education program;

3. Submit the completed application form along with a written essay explaining why you are the best possible candidate for the scholarship.

Added consideration will be given to applicants enrolled in animal/agriculture-related courses, and those experienced with Belted Galloway cattle. Extracurricular and out-of-school activities will also be taken into consideration.

A. The Belted Galloway Society membership decreased slightly from 2021. The decrease in membership can partly be attributed to a generational wave of retirements, herd dispersals and passing away. The Council has mechanisms in place to increase overall membership in 2023, with special interests in expanding upon active and involved members in the Society as well as the Junior membership.

B. Overall, registrations are up from 2021. Purebred registrations increased by 59 registrations. Non-Purebred registrations stayed the same. Transfers of animals grew by 118 head.

C. Hypotrichosis Results

C. Hypotrichosis is a genetic defect found in cattle. The BGS offers testing to determine Belted Galloway Animals who are carriers of this disease. In 2022, 21 animals were tested and 8.3% were determined carriers of Hypotrichosis. In 2021, only 12 animals were tested which resulted in a higher percentage determined carriers at 10.4%.

WHAT IS HYPOTRICHOSIS?

Hypotrichosis is an (inherited) disease in certain breeds of cattle including Belties. It is usually observed at birth when the calf lacks patches of hair or has thin, fine, straight, light gray hair on its stomach and legs. As the calf grows, the coat may grow almost naturally or not at all, but the pink skin will always show through the underside of the belt.

A DNA test that can be run on hair samples has been developed for identifying Belties that carry the gene for hypotrichrosis. Test kits for hypotrichosis can be secured by contacting the Executive Director of the Belted Galloway Society at executivedirector.bgs@gmail.com. The Executive Director will fill out the test application based on the information provided. The kit, with sampling and mailing instructions, will be forwarded to the owner by the director after receiving it from the laboratory at UC Davis.

WHAT IS BEEF QUALITY ASSURANCE?



Millions of pounds of beef are recalled each year in the US a stark reminder that concern over food wholesomeness and safety is a constant and important consumer issue. The top quality challenged identified by the most recent the National Beef Quality Audit was food safety, and consumers not only deserve, but demand a safe food supply. Anyone involved in the cattle industry, from the cow-calf rancher to the retailer, has a stake in beef quality assurance.

As you start planning for spring, keep in mind that every management practice that you or your veterinarian performs on your cattle may affect the wholesomeness and quality of the end product. The Beef Quality Assurance (BQA) Program is a national program that raises consumer confidence through offering proper management techniques and a commitment to quality within every segment of the beef industry. Beef Quality Assurance guidelines are intended to provide consistency in good management practices, and include guidelines on feedstuffs, feed additives and medications, processing/treatment records, injectable animal health products, and care and husbandry practices.

The goal of the BQA program is to assure our consumers that all cattle shipped from a beef production facility are healthy, wholesome and safe. BQA is designed to enhance carcass quality by preventing residues, pathogen contamination and carcass defects such as injection site blemishes and bruises. Many of the BQA herd health guidelines have been discussed previously: proper use of vaccinations to prevent disease, proper care of biologicals, and developing good biosecurity protocols, to name a few. The program also asks everyone involved with beef production to follow the FDA/USDA/EPA guidelines for product use and to use common sense, reasonable management skills, and accepted scientific knowledge to avoid product defects at the consumer level.

The National BQA Program is a cooperative effort between beef producers, veterinarians, nutritionists, and professionals based on recommended national guidelines for product use and to use common sense, reasonable management skills, and accepted scientific knowledge

to avoid product defects at the consumer level. Every management practice that you perform on your farm may affect the wholesomeness and quality of the end product. research.

The BQA program consists of three production themes based on good management practices (GMP's) for livestock: targeted breeding, proper management and responsible culling. Targeted breeding in your herd equals customer satisfaction, concentrating on carcass products as the ultimate consumer endpoint. This includes setting production goals for your operation and using known genetics and a defined breeding plan to meet these goals. Proper management practices enhance beef quality and product value, and assist in preventing problems rather than fixing them. Adopting good management practices will help you improve on things that you are already doing, for example, by providing processing, medication and record-keeping guidelines. Responsible culling improves herd productivity and efficiency by ensuring that you do not keep your problem animals. This includes giving attention to quality control points such as body condition, reproductive management, and disease control.

Beef Quality Assurance producer certification can be accomplished by attending a local BQA meeting most often hosted by your local Cattlemen's Association or your State Beef Council or online through the National BQA Website. Certification costs may differ from state to state or may be free through an organization.

Remember, as cattle producers, we are responsible for delivering a safe and wholesome food supply. Seedstock, cow-calf and dairy producers, stocker operators, feeders, and veterinarians all must take responsibility for the production of a safe food product through proper animal care, handling, and management practices.






